Course Objectives: The objective of this course is getting you to think critically about language. What does that mean? "Thinking critically" is often academic-speak for "being able to have a knowledgeable opinion." As you will discover, there are many opinions and beliefs about language—you may be surprised to learn how many!—but often they are based on myth rather than reality.

In this class, you will learn about language as a uniquely human phenomenon and examine the properties that all languages have in common. You will learn about language diversity, language change, and the relationships between language, culture, and identity. Finally, you will learn about some of the applications of linguistic theory in other fields, such as computer science and education.

Reading Assignments: Please read the assigned reading <u>before</u> the class they are to be discussed in. I recommend taking notes while you are reading so that you can ask questions about the material in class. If you find that you are struggling to keep up with the reading assignments, please contact me or visit me during my office hours so I can help you before it becomes a serious problem.

Homework Assignments: Homework assignments must be handed in <u>before</u> the start of class on the day they are due, otherwise they will not be accepted. You may miss two homework assignments with no penalty. The purpose of the homework is to help you check your own understanding of the reading material. You are not expected to answer all of the exercise questions correctly and this is reflected in the grading.

Exams: There will be an in-class midterm exam and a take home final exam.

Quizzes: There will be four quizzes. They are not currently on the schedule but will be added to a revised schedule that I will hand out on the second day of class.

In-Class Activities: There will be in-class activities nearly every day, including an ongoing group project which I will discuss later. You may miss two in-class activities

with no penalty. However, if you know ahead of time that you will miss class, please let me know in case it affects the ongoing group project.

Myth Reports: You must choose (from a list I will give you) two chapters from the book *Language Myths*, read them, and submit a short (1 page) report on each myth. The due dates and other details for this assignment will be explained on a supplementary handout on the second day of class.

Talks & Experiments: Students in all sections of Linguistics 201 must fulfill a requirement called *Linguistics Outside of the Classroom: Talks and Experiments*. To fulfill this requirement you must either participate in two linguistics experiments or attend two talks or video presentations or do one of each. Each project requires you to complete and submit a questionnaire. Questionnaires are given out at the talks and experiments.
